Parks Celebrate Recreation and Parks Month

Governor Charlie Crist has proclaimed July as Recreation and Parks Month.

Florida's state parks will celebrate by kicking-off its children in nature campaign. *Family. Friends. Fun.*, the theme of the campaign, will support a national

initiative to get children back in touch with the natural world. On Sunday, July 13, Florida's state parks will welcome all visitors free of charge.

The children in nature movement began with Richard Louv's book, *The Last Child in the Woods: Saving Our Children From Nature-Deficit Disorder*. Louv revealed that children who spend time outdoors are healthier, happier and perform better in school. Studies show that the epidemic of young people between eight and 18 years of age average almost seven hours per day playing inside on computers, video games and watching television. Increased cases of obesity, Attention Deficit Disorder and depression, among other factors, have resulted.
