





Target 6, Thematic Priority 1.3 Hygiene and Health through Water and Sanitation Wednesday 14 March, 14:30-16:30

## **TARGET**

By 2015, 30 additional countries will have established national policies and/or regulations regarding household water treatment and safe storage and point of use water treatment; by 2018, 50 more countries will have reached this target; the scale-up process will be based on gradual and measurable increase of sound evidence of the public health benefits of this approach.

## **Session Description**

Low-cost interventions for household-based treatment of drinking-water and safe storage can significantly reduce the pathogen load in drinkingwater and, thereby, reduce the risk of diarrhoeal diseases. Achieving tangible results in the scaling-up of household water treatment and safe storage (HWTS) depends, in large part, on national enabling environments and supportive national policies. International targets on establishing national HWTS policies have been articulated in the Strategy of the International Network on Household Water Treatment and Safe Storage and have been adopted by the World Water Forum 2012. This session will focus on the importance of these policies, links to implementation and the role of all key stakeholders in informing and supporting effective policy development.

- Global overview of status of national HWTS polices and specific examples of innovative government action from Thailand and Democratic Republic of Congo

- Moderated discussion of commitments sought from key stakeholders
